


DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATION CHART




EMERGENCY RESPONSE MAP

ADMINISTRATION

Overview

The year 2023 brought significant change and growth in the department. One Fire Chief retired, and the City hired an interim Fire Chief to guide the department forward while a new Chief was selected.

During the interim Fire Chief's tenure, we strengthened our command structure by creating and filling key positions, including a Division Chief of Training/EMS and an Administrative Captain for EMT program management, while also advancing individuals to Deputy Chief and Battalion Chief roles.



Chief Washington assumed command of Vista Fire Department in August. Under his leadership, the department has entered a new era of growth and innovation.

Highlights

- Internally promoted one Staff Assistant, two Engineers, two Captains, two Battalion Chiefs, one Division Chief, and one Deputy Chief. Our new Fire Chief was also appointed to lead the department.
- Added two basic life support (BLS) ambulances to the department with 12 full-time EMT positions.
- Added a Fire Marshal to supervise Fire Prevention.
- Added one full-time Fire Inspector for a total of four.
- Added an Administrative Captain to oversee the BLS ambulance program.
- Submitted annual accreditation report to the Center for Public Safety Excellence.
- Fire District Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) was updated by Ed Kramer and Vista Fire Protection District Director John Ploetz.
- Grant was awarded for community risk assessment and standards of cover.
- Ambulance fee study was awarded and initiated.
- Assistance to Firefighters grant was submitted and awarded (wellness/cancer screening).
- Automated external defibrillator (AED) grant was awarded.
- Extrication grant was awarded.

ADMINISTRATION

Recruitment/Retention Programs

Working with our recruitment committee, we've expanded our outreach through career days at Vista public high schools to build a more diverse workforce.

We participated in the CAL-JAC Firefighter Expo at the new Firefighter Candidate Testing Center in Carlsbad.

Our retention committee holds quarterly meetings to address challenges and implement strategies for improvement. We are launching a mentorship program designed to foster positive cultural transformation within our department.

Through strategic partnerships with North County Fire Protection District and Oceanside Fire Department, we developed a targeted mentorship program for female EMTs.

This initiative, combined with our leadership development courses, supports both workforce diversity and professional growth within our teams.







ADMINISTRATION

Counseling Services

All department members have 24/7 access to confidential support through multiple resources, whether seeking help for job-related stress or personal challenges. These services ensure that no matter when or how someone needs support, there's always a trusted resource available to help.



Peer Support

We're committed to support our department's mental and behavioral health by supporting resiliency and peer support training and conducting critical incident stress debriefings (CISD). Our members face challenges that extend far beyond the emergency scene, which is why the Peer Support Team (PST) serves as a vital lifeline within the department.



The majority of funding is received from property and sales tax. The department also receives property tax funding from the Vista Fire Protection District. Ambulance fees provide 17% of funding with fire fees including strike team reimbursement and fire prevention fees providing 2% of funding.



Public Education

Education is a key to the success of our mission. We offer education and training to citizens and local businesses including learning about fire extinguisher use and inspections, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), first aid, senior safety, campus fire safety, and installations of smoke alarms (upon request). We can also assist with emergency and fire evacuation planning. We are committed to making accommodations to support a diverse range of community members based on each individual's abilities.

Vista Fire Department hosted an open house in October 2023 and offered numerous fire station tours throughout the year.



OPERATIONS

Overview

The Operations division grew in 2023. The Deputy Chief of Operations oversees more than 100 staff members throughout our six geographically placed fire stations. This includes three shifts that staff five fire engines, one ladder truck, four advanced life support (ALS) ambulances, two BLS ambulances, and one battalion. The Deputy Chief oversees and manages the facilities and fire equipment and manages the day-to-day operations of the department.

Apparatus

We have been actively involved in the budgeting, procurement, and maintenance of apparatus and equipment. This includes overseeing apparatus purchases and ordering and outfitting emergency vehicles with necessary equipment. Regular maintenance schedules were implemented to keep our vehicles in optimal condition and ready to respond to emergencies promptly and efficiently.

The department received two stock fire engines that were placed in service in 2023. Late in 2023, we took delivery of two custom-built fire engines that will be stationed at Fire Stations 1 and 5. The investment in four new fire engines was necessary to replace aging equipment that had become costly to maintain. The new engines will improve the department's ability to respond effectively to emergencies in the community. In July, we integrated a new 2023 Pierce brush fire engine at Fire Station 2. This replaced a 20year-old brush engine.

The department expanded the emergency response fleet with a new 2023 ambulance at Fire Station 3, complementing the recently acquired fire engines.







OPERATIONS

Facilities

Vista Fire Department operates out of six fire stations. Fire Station 3, at 1070 Old Taylor Street, is the oldest fire station.

After serving our community since 1961, Fire Station 3 will be replaced through a joint effort between the City of Vista and Vista Fire Protection District. With design plans completed in 2023, construction of the new facility will begin mid-2024 and finish in late 2025.

Facility Management

Our team works closely with City of Vista Public Works and vendors to maintain all critical station systems – from alerting and apparatus doors to plumbing and plymovent – ensuring our facilities remain fully operational and ready to serve.

Other Highlights

Our ambulance fleet now features advanced selfloading gurneys, improving patient comfort while reducing crew injury risk during transport.

OPERATIONS

North Zone

The San Diego North Zone (North Zone) is comprised of fire agencies throughout North San Diego County, including CalFire/San Diego County, Carlsbad, Camp Pendleton, Del Mar, Encinitas, Escondido, North County Dispatch JPA, North County Fire, Oceanside, Pala, Pauma, Rancho Santa Fe, Rincon, San Marcos, San Pasqual, Solana Beach, Valley Center, and Vista.

The mission of the North Zone is to foster operational readiness by coordinating emergency response planning, aligned with expansion of services provided by developing strategic collaboration with the participating agencies.

Agencies participate in automatic aid by utilizing Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) technology and Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) to send the closest resource(s) to the emergency regardless of jurisdictional boundary.

North County Dispatch Joint Powers Authority (NCDJPA)

Vista Fire Department is a member agency of NCDJPA (known as North Comm). The dispatch center has eight member agencies: Carlsbad Fire Department, Encinitas Fire Department, North County Fire Protection District, Oceanside Fire Department, Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District, San Marcos Fire Department, Solana Beach Fire Department, and Vista Fire Department.




Also, the dispatch center has eight contract agencies: CSA-17 Ambulance District, City of Del Mar, Pauma Reservation Fire Department, Pala Reservation Fire Department, Rincon Reservation Fire Department, Rancho Santa Fe Patrol, San Pasqual Reservation Fire Department, and Valley Center Fire Protection District. North Comm handled almost 80,000 emergency calls in 2023.

TRAINING AND EMS DIVISION

Overview

The Vista City Council's approval of a BLS ambulance program in 2023 marked a significant advancement for our community and established a dedicated Training and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) division. This specialized division now serves as the cornerstone of firefighter/paramedic and EMT excellence, overseeing all aspects of training, EMS quality assurance, and safety protocols for personnel.

The Training and EMS division maintains the highest standards in emergency medical care and professional development mandated by the County of San Diego, State of California, and internally. Under the direction of a Division Chief, the team includes a Battalion Chief of Training, Emergency Services Officer, and Administrative Captain.



Hiring and Promotions

In 2023, the department hired four new firefighter/paramedics that completed an in-house, five-week academy and proctored 24 fire cadet trainings. We continue to prioritize first-class training to ensure we are an innovative and forward-leaning organization.

TRAINING

Managed by the Battalion Chief of Training and with the assistance of the training cadre, the division successfully implemented an Annual Training Plan (ATP) in July 2023 to support the department's mission and vision. The ATP forms a comprehensive all-hazards training plan combined with company performance standards, opportunity training, and discipline-specific training from the training cadres of North San Diego County fire agencies. This plan is a strategic priority for the department.

Key Highlights

- Personnel logged over **27,650** hours of training in 2023 through a combination of classroom, hands-on, and online training.
- Recorded **9,940** hours under the Joint Apprenticeship Committee (JAC).
- Dedicated 4,946 hours to wellness and physical fitness, including conducting skin cancer screenings and respiratory fit testing.
- Served as the North San Diego County fire agency zone lead for 2023 Captains testing, provided instructors for rope rescue training, and also participated in Engineer testing, mass casualty incident (MCI) drills, HAZMAT drills, and confined space drills. Participated in emergency communications drills using VHF radios.
- Conducted separate task-level and tactical-level drills for a total of 42 hours of manipulative training. Partnered with a Vista business owner to pre-plan a new industrial laundry facility. Also participated in an active shooter drill.
- Attended conferences including the Cardiac Arrest Survival Summit, the Fresno Training Symposium, and the California Fire EMS Disaster (CFED) Conference and Expo.

- Regional training included quarterly advanced/specialized firefighter training with neighboring departments, County Wildland Preparedness Drill, North Zone Captains Academy, North Zone Chiefs Academy, Explorer Recruitment Jamboree in San Diego, and Southern California Training Officers "Snow-mageddon" Presentation from the San Bernardino winter disaster.
- Engaged in a contract with Oceanside Fire Department to train at their recently updated fire training facility. The department also made investments in video equipment, a forcible entry prop, and audio/visual upgrades at Station 1 and Station 6. Ladder and hose testing were both conducted.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES



More commonly known as EMS, this division provides patient-centered care for both BLS and ALS 911 emergency responses and provides medical care and transport.

We provide skilled training and education to maintain current and up-to-date pre-hospital practice. We pride ourselves on providing exceptional customer service to all the residents of the City of Vista and the Vista Fire Protection District, and our diverse workforce is only matched by its diverse community.

Highlights/Community Partnerships

The EMS division participates in numerous community events.

In February, as part of "Love Your Heart Week," the McClellan Senior Center hosted free blood pressure checks provided by the Vista Fire Department.

In June, a local business taught their employees hands-only CPR and AED use prior to accessing 911. We gladly stepped in.

We are ambassadors by being inspiring and leading by example. We're excited to have partnerships with Vista Unified School District, Firefighter Candidate Testing Centers (FCTC), Palomar College, and Orange County Emergency Medical Training.





EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The department responded to over 16,000 incidents in 2023. Here are two examples that highlight our team's exceptional customer service to the community.

In April, we responded to a CPR call. After 70 minutes of CPR, what started as an emergency call ended in a miracle: our patient not only survived but returned to thank his rescuers in person, fully recovered and grateful to shake the hands of those who saved his life.



In July, a routine abdominal pain call transformed into something extraordinary when a baby girl made her surprise debut, turning unsuspecting parents and stunned paramedics into an impromptu delivery team.



CADET PROGRAM

The department transformed the explorer program into an enhanced cadet program through a collaborative effort between administrative staff and cadet leadership. This reimagined program features updated goals and objectives to better serve aspiring firefighter/paramedics.

The program introduces young adults to the multifaceted world of fire and emergency services while fostering leadership qualities and professional skills.

Open to qualified high school and college students, the program brings together young women and men who share a passion for firefighting and emergency services. Participants engage in vocational training while building the foundation for their future careers. Under the guidance of Vista Fire Department personnel, cadets complete both hands-on training and classroom instruction aligned with North Zone Fire Academy standards. This professional training ensures cadets learn current best practices and procedures. Upon certification, cadets become eligible for ride-along opportunities with active duty crews.





These supervised experiences allow cadets to observe emergency response procedures firsthand, interact with firefighter/paramedics throughout their shifts, respond to emergency calls in a safe, observational capacity, and experience daily life in a working fire station.

PEER FITNESS

The Peer Fitness Training (PFT) program stands as a cornerstone of an athletic approach to firefighting, built on the understanding that every physical task—whether forcing entry, advancing hose lines, or performing rescues—requires specific strength, flexibility, and stamina. Sessions move from dynamic warm-ups through stability work and functional movements that mimic real-world scenarios and conclude with proper cool-down techniques. By embedding PFT into department culture, we ensure we maintain physical resilience while fostering a supportive environment where fitness is viewed as an essential part of the job, not just an optional activity.

EMT PROGRAM

Established in October 2023 and managed by the Administrative Captain with assistance from the EMT cadre, the EMT program provides exceptional BLS-level care to the community.

The significance of the BLS program extends far beyond the confines of our department; it serves as a catalyst for positive change and mutual benefit. At its core lies a commitment to serving our most important stakeholder: our community. Through rigorous training and continuous improvement, our EMTs hone their clinical skills but also cultivate a mindset of empathy and dedication, ensuring that each interaction with our residents is characterized by compassion and competence.

"Learn by Doing" isn't just a motto; it's a guiding principle that shapes our approach to training and professional development.

Key Highlights

- Appointed Administrative Captain in August 2023.
- Onboarded EMT class 1 in October 2023.
- Deployed BLS 125 in November 2023.





As we continue our BLS program, the Vista Fire Department will be purchasing new ambulances specific to the BLS program.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Overview

Emergency management prepares for and coordinates responses to emergencies, natural disasters, and other critical incidents, which includes developing emergency plans, training personnel, and ensuring the availability of necessary resources while providing guidance, support, and resources to help communities and individuals be better prepared to respond to and recover from emergencies.

Key Highlights

- Emergency Manager Appointed as Designated Terror Liaison Officer: Vista Fire Department appointed the Emergency Manager (EM) to the role of Terror Liaison Officer, or TLO. Since re-titled as a Threat Liaison Officer, the TLO has the responsibility within the City of Vista to report and disseminate suspicious activity and/or other threat-related information.
- **FEMA's Public-Private Partnerships (P3) Programming:** In August, the EM was approached by FEMA to engage in one of their programs designated as Public-Private Partnerships or P3.
- **FEMA's Community Lifelines Initiative:** In March, the EM officially partnered with FEMA (Region 9) to begin a year-long process for initiating a community lifelines program in the City of Vista. A lifeline enables the continuous operation of critical government and business functions and is essential to human health and safety or economic security.
- Vista Community Resiliency Coalition (VCRC): In July, the EM convened the inaugural meeting of the Vista Community Resiliency Coalition or VCRC. Seventeen organizations from the greater Vista area participated in and endorsed the proposed coalition. In 2023, more than 30 people have asked to be included in the coalition.
- **Re-Building the CERT Program:** CERT, which stands for Community Emergency Response Team, is a program that educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may occur where they live. It trains volunteers in basic skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.
